1.	Des	cribe	the	Pro	ject

This project entails building a multi-court pickleball facility in the large grassy area near Abercrombie Field. It will consist of six courts with nets, an 8-ft. exterior fence surrounding all six courts, and the courts separated into three pairs, with 4-ft. fencing between the pairs. Additionally, there will be approximately 15 parking spaces, including a wheelchair accessible space. The renovation will also include site amenities such as benches, bike racks, trash receptacles, and a water fountain and bottle fill station, if water service to the location already exists.

2. What are the goals of the proposed project?

The goals are to increase the number of pickleball courts/recreational space available in the City, providing participants of all ages and abilities an opportunity to learn a new sport, and to fulfill one of several objectives, in both the Greenfield Master Plan and the 2021 Open Space and Recreation Plan, by creating new recreational facilities. Additionally, six new courts in the City brings the total to seven, at two different parks, and builds important capacity where demand already exists.

3. Who will benefit from this project and why/how?

Pickleball is a sport that can engage users of all ages and abilities. Players of any experience level can use a facility like this casually for recreation. More serious/competitive players will be able to partake in leagues and/or tournaments. The City as a whole also benefits from having this property redeveloped for recreational purposes, as it is currently a grassy field. These courts will provide another opportunity for residents to participate in active recreation.

- 4. How will you measure your success?
- -Increasing the number of standard pickleball courts available in the City will be the primary measure of success. Currently, the active group of community participants regularly sets up temporary courts to accommodate demand.
- -Seeing the courts used for tournaments, leagues, and formal instruction/lessons for the community is another measure. Currently, avid players are traveling to other municipalities to use their facilities. Having a larger facility will be an economic driver with the addition of these more structured activities.
- -Community feedback, website analytics from Recreation Department website searches for pickleball facilities, and social media postings will support/confirm success.
- 5. How does this project fit with the requirements of the Community Preservation Act? (See attached chart)

The CPA allows for funds to be disbursed for the creation and rehabilitation of land for recreational use. This pickleball facility will create a new recreational facility in the City, on underutilized land that is City owned. When developed, courts will be available for the entire community, and beyond. The project aligns with the Community Preservation Committee's goals of enhancing recreation facilities and increasing access to public recreation facilities.

Greenfield's pickleball enthusiasts have been actively creating a buzz to build additional courts in the City as well. Our letters of support are included with this application.

This project has also been submitted for funding in the City of Greenfield FY25 Capital Budget cycle, and a combination of Capital and CPA funds will assist with meeting total cost. Greenfield (MA) Pickleball will work directly with Greenfield Recreation on developing a volunteer group to assist with upkeep as needed. As reference, the current City pickleball court at Green River Park has needed little maintenance.

Dear Community Preservation Committee,

The Recreation Department is in full support of Amy Proietti's application for the creation of 6 additional pickleball courts with parking and sidewalk within Abercrombie Park that currently exists as open, grassy field area. Last year the Committee was generous enough to allocate \$50,000 towards the feasibility study and design plans for new courts which will be moving forward shortly. The Recreation Department has also submitted a FY25 Capital Request for the project.

Packed with health and social benefits, pickleball is one of the fastest growing sports in the country. The pandemic only helped to fuel pickleball's growth in the area. While pickleball used to be viewed as a sport for older populations, its popularity has expanded cross-generationally.
